Impact Report: Donor Dollars at Work

What a year! In spite of COVID-19, we still made an immense difference in the lives of many during guarter 4 of our fiscal year thanks to our valued donors and community partners.

ReadingPals: Although the ReadingPal year ended early, volunteers were still able to assist 288 children in 69 classrooms across the county. These children received over 5,000 hours of additional literacy instruction, and 2,880 books were distributed to ReadingPal children.



Mission United: Our program assisted 22 additional veterans this quarter, bringing the yearly total to 137. Mission United steps in as needed to assist this group with any unforeseen circumstance that puts them on the verge of crisis. We partner with other area agencies and local businesses too in order to take care of this selfless group. In the above picture, one of our client's is celebrating his 98th birthday. Mission United and the Combat Veterans' Motorcycle Association partnered to assist him by trimming trees, cleaning his roof, building a wheelchair ramp, and presenting him with a new flag.

The Prosperity Center: Workforce development is at the heart of this worthwhile program. This fiscal year, we were able to help **121** adult education students as they worked hard to complete their education. At the end of this fiscal year, 18 of our clients graduated with a degree or certificate, and 25 received their GEDs. By enabling these adults to complete their education, they are able to earn a family sustaining wage, which not only changes the trajectory of their lives, but the lives of their children as well.

Rapid Rehousing: This fiscal year, our Rapid Rehousing program assisted 94 families to keep them safely and steadily housed. These clients are case-managed for one year after entering this program.

Thanks to our COVID-19 Relief Fund, we have assisted numerous families in Citrus County who were financially impacted through no fault of their own. One that comes to mind is a family of six: two adults and four children. The wife is a stay-at-home mom, and the husband is employed by a local restaurant. When the restaurant closed due to COVID-19, the family endured a financial crisis, as their only source of income had disappeared. The husband applied for unemployment immediately, but due to the overwhelming demand, he did not receive it for quite some time. The family had never asked for any type of assistance before, so reaching out to us was difficult for them. We are glad they did though. We were able to pay one month's rent, as well as their electric bill thanks to the generous donors and organizations who have given to our COVID-19 Relief Fund. He is now back to work and the family no longer requires assistance.

This is only one success story, and there are many more just like it. The people we are able to assist are beyond grateful for the support we provide and are happy that United Way has their backs!


Feeding Citrus
